## Data Glossary

### Minority Tracts

Percent of census tracts in which the percentage of the population identifying as non-white is greater than 50 percent, per the American Community Survey 2011-2015 data

### Poverty Rate

Total individuals in poverty as a percentage of total individuals for whom poverty status is determined, per the American Community Survey 2011-2015 data

### Median Income

Average median household income, per the American Community Survey 2011-2015 data

### Bachelor Degree +

Total percent of adults age 25 and older who hold a bachelor's degree or higher, per the American Community Survey 2011-2015 data

### Adults Not Working

Total percent of adults age 25 to 64 not working, per the American Community Survey 2011-2015 data

### Median Home Age

Average median home age, per the American Community Survey 2011-2015 data

### Rent Burdened

Percent of low-income, renter-occupied households that spend 30%+ of their household income on housing, per the American Community Survey 2011-2015 data

National summary statistics do not include U.S. territories

2011-2015 data was used for the purpose of consistency with the data used to determine eligibility for the majority Opportunity Zones
